# THE COMIC BOOKS

By Ioe Brancatelli

ustralian press baron and National Star publisher Rupert Murdoch ponied up an estimated \$30 million in December to buy the chronically ill New York Post from autocratic old Dolly Schiff. On the same day he officially became publisher of the paper Alexander Hamilton founded in 1801, he also purchased controlling interest in the company which publishes New York. New West and the Village Voice.

Now Murdoch, who owns the San Arationio Newe5zpress and about 85 other papers in England and Australia, still has plenty of money left to throw around. Chances are that he won't comic-book company, however, and that said, don't expect any major upheavals in the industry during 1977. There's bound to be a passel of smaller changes, though, and here are some of the pos-

Acep an eye on Archie Goodwin, presently the Goodwin, presently the Archie is one of the few really talented people in the field, and certainly one of the most popular, but his track record shows he's a restless man. He'll have been with Stan the Man and Mayeve you read this and it wouldn't surprise me if he's with an other company before the end of 1977.

No guesswork here, either, just the law of averages. He seems to move from one company to the next every 18 months or so and he's made the National-Marvel-Warren circuit no less than twice in the last decade.

dilla may well emerge as this year's Howey for Duck and lay the groundwork for a whole series of Japanese monster comics. After dickering with the Japanese for four years, Marvel finally went ahead and got the rights to the world's most popular reptile and the first issue of Godzilla comics is due out soon.

And even though Marvel has the often-demonstrated penchant for screwing up sure things, Godzilla's incredible popularity among pre-teens will easily get him through a "House of Ideas" adaptation. I'm wondering whether Stan and the boys are even aware of the extent of Godzilla's rabid following. When I was the managing editor of The Monster Times in 1972 and 1973, we realized Godzilla and his Oriental friends were clearly America's favorite monsters, easily outstripping King Kong, Frankenstein and the other pretenders to the throne. We started a Godzilla column and readers wrote thousands of letters to it. When we ran Godzilla against Nixon, McGovern and "insurgent King Kong in a 1972 election-year poll, Godzilla not only got something like 75 per cent of the readers votes. but editor Joe Kane's hilariously tongue-in-cheek "Godzilla-for-President" campaign rhetoric and poster became an adult craze and garnered the paper a bonanza in free

television news coverage. Godzilla is a shoo-in for best selling new title of 1977. Marvel should have done it years ago.

emember the name Steve Ross and look for something to change over at National, Ross, chairman of the board of Warner Communications, has let it be known that all of Warner Publishing is for sale-cheap. While the word is out that Warner would like to dump its whole print group-which includes Mad, Independent News and Warner books-the conglomerate might also be amenable to selling off just the comics end, as long as Warner retains the lucrative licensing rights and the distribution contract.

On the other hand, should Warner be unable to divest itself of DC, I wouldn't bet my life savings on another full year of leadership from publisher Jeanette Kahn. Everyone's quick to say nice things about her publically, but privately no one says much for her publishing acu-

men. Patience in her may be wearing thin at the corporate level and, barring a dramatic sales and profit turnaround, Warner may think her and her simplistic and superficial "messages of untold importance" to the readers are expendable.

his will be an important year for Phil Seuling, long-time king of comicbook conventions. He's had several spectacularly appointing New York Conventions is succession, culminating in last year's disastrous patchwork conclave, and his prestige and reputation are slipping. San Diego's Con is almost universally recognized as THE comicbook convention now, surplanting Seuling's 9-year-old event, and his attendance has slipped badly.

Should this year's convention bomb, Seuling might face major competition in the New York "market" in 1978, probably from another dealer who'd attempt to organize a New York Convention on the Independence Day weekend. Certainly the schoolteacher - cum - comics - mogul can't be faulted for much of last year's debacle-his hotel closed a month before the convention and finding an other site in the midst of New York's Bicentennial madness was nearly impossible-but this has to be viewed as a put-up-or-shutup year for him. Should 1977's convention be as dull and lifeless as his last two or three attempts, he may very well find himself in head-to-head competition with another promoter bent on running the "traditional" July 4th convention in New

1971 is also destined to be the year of Maurice Horn.
Despite the fact that the comic-book industry is rapidly making itself extinct, academic interest in comicbooks will reach an all-time high this year and Horn is far and away the most visible of all comic art critics. While this 1976 project, The World Encyclopédia of Comics, was being justifiably pelted by the fans for numerous in-

accuracies, Horn has a 2inch thick file of rave reviews from daily newspapers. Rightly or wrongly, those raves, the Encyclopedia and his past accomplishments will unshakably establish his credentials as the nation's leading comics expert. No one will be able to touch him. He's already got at least one book on tap for 1977, Western Comics (Winchester Press, \$15), is still reaping the benefits of his highly successful lecture at the Smithsonian Institute's culture seminar last September and will surely emerge as the industry's most viable spokesman in the next decade.

He's got a ton of powerful enemies, most notably the syncophantic National Cartoonist Society, but chances are he'll be the generator and prime recipient of most of the academic and media attention aimed at comics in 1977.

s usual, Robert Crumb will continue carrying the credibility of the whole underground movement on his shoulders-even though neither he nor the rest of the undergrounders are willing to admit it. While the rest of the movement floundered unnoticed in 1976. as it did in 1975 and 1974 before that, Crumb started a short-lived Mr. Natural feature in the Village Voice, then unwittingly caused a furor when he voluntarily ended the strip some months later. On top of that, his Carload O'Comics was surely the only worthwhile underground book published during the year. For better or worse, he is the underground movement right now, like



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
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
